Appendix A includes brief annotations and URLs for each chapter in <u>New Threats to Academic Freedom</u> <u>in Asia</u>. **Table 2** ranks the top 10 countries in the world for freedoms in the five indexes. **Table 3** has the top 10 from the 22 countries in East Asia. There is a stand-alone Table 4 that has complete results for East Asia.

New Threats to Academic Freedom in Asia

The book uses "Asia" to cover the countries in East and Southeast Asia, highlighting Japan, Singapore, China, and Indonesia. The introduction provides an overview of each chapter. For those who like data, I recommend Chapter One, which has the broadest coverage of countries.

Chapter 1 Academic Freedom in Asia 1900-2021: A quantitative overview including results from AFi, covering a cross-national and cross-regional overview of academic freedom in Asia over time. It covers the broadest range of countries in the region, disaggregating data from V-Dem's Academic Freedom index (AFi). The regional average is below the world average. Only MENA (Middle East and Africa) has lower scores. Countries that have deteriorated over time include India, Thailand, and Hong Kong. According to V-dem regime types, political polarization, and lack of institutional autonomy are factors in negative trends. Chapter 5 – In the name of the nation: Restrictions on academic freedom in contemporary Indonesian higher education (Nugroho). I found this chapter interesting since the government issued a new criminal code in December 2022 (Yamin). Indonesia is eight out of 22 eastern Asian countries. Its academic freedom score has changed over time with changes in the government. With an upcoming election in 2024, it is not known how the criminal code will be used by the future administration. According to Nugroho, caution is needed in all the topics that she mentions in the chapter https://www.asianstudies.org/wp-content/uploads/Chapter-Five-Nugroho.pdf

Afterward – Canary in a coal mine, the impact of China's National Security Law (NSL) on academic freedom in the UK and other countries (Thornton), https://www.asianstudies.org/wp-content/uploads/Afterword-Thornton.pdf.). The chapter includes the results of a survey quantifying the impact of laws such as the NSL on researchers. (University of Exeter).

Although there is no chapter on India, it is covered in the introduction and in Chapter One. Recent articles involving Modi and the BBC raise additional concerns about India (Wright).

FREEDOM INDEXES are at a country level. <u>RR 21</u> introduced them in conjunction with flagship universities and updated them in <u>RR 48 Part 2</u>, new indicators. The indexes publish background information, with data and visualizations. AFi, now released by <u>V-Dem</u>, is the only index specifically designed to measure academic freedom. It uses five categories of freedoms:

- Freedom to research & teach
- Freedom of academic exchange & dissemination
- Institutional autonomy of universities
- Campus integrity
- Freedom of academic & cultural expression

The entire dataset is available for download.

Top Countries in the world: Table 2 lists the top ten countries in the world across the five indexes. What do these countries have in common? Most are from northern Europe with populations around the world median of 6 million (US Census) and in the top 25% of gross national income per capita (World Bank). Using US News Global, 15 universities from these 24 top-ranked countries are in the world's top 10.

NOTES: Highlighted countries appear in more than one ranking. Sweden is in the top ten for all five indexes, followed by Denmark, Ireland, and Finland in four, and Switzerland, Estonia, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Norway, and New Zealand in three. 11 countries are in the top 10 in the world in more than one of the indexes. These 11 countries have a total population of less than one percent of the world's population. Overall, 17 of those ranked in the top 10 are in Europe. Readers interested in a European perspective can listen to "Rebuilding history, (re) building the nation - no freedom for academics" (Popović).

Countries in East Asia: Results are different for East Asia, with the number one county rankings ranging from 10 to 42 in the world and the tenth from 66 to 139. 19 countries have populations larger than the world's median and just five have Gross National Income per capita in the world top 50 (World Bank). Bhutan, India, and Nepal are in the bottom 30 percent in income and literacy and Bhutan and Nepal each rank first in an index. **Appendix C** includes rankings for all 22 East Asian countries.
